# TURKISH BALCONIES

#### The Problem

While Turkish people enjoy spending time on their balconies, they often face the challenge of limited space. The balconies are usually too small to accommodate seating sets comfortably. Furthermore, using only a few chairs is not the most conducive way to sit, eat, drink, and socialize on balconies. This issue is particularly problematic for elderly individuals, as they may find it difficult to move even a single chair or clean the balcony when furniture occupies the space.

### What do they think?

#### What should they think?

We settle into my balcony very comfortably. It's fun to sit on the balcony with friends.

### Persona

Why do the elderly enjoy balconies?

They often take care of the flowers on their balconies, talking to and nurturing them with affection.

Balconies frequently **host animal visitors** like pigeons and sparrows. Elderly individuals like to leave breadcrumbs for these feathered friends.

Balconies play a significant role in **socialization**, serving as a space for chatting and social interactions.

Balconies are an extension of **neighborhood culture**. Elderly neighbors sometimes engage in conversations from one balcony to another, or even from their balcony to someone in the garden.

Balconies also serve as a makeshift pantry for many elders. In Turkey, most houses lack a dedicated pantry space, so some food items are stored in cabinets on the balcony. Additionally, in Turkish culture, sharing home-cooked meals is common, and elders often store leftover food on the balcony during winter since the cold weather helps preserve it.
